Original Constitutional Protections

- Petition for writ of habeas corpus
- Bill of attainder
- Ex post facto laws
- Trials for federal crimes should be jury trials in the state where the crime was committed.
- Conviction of treason requires two witnesses or a confession in open court.



Protections Found in the Bill of Rights

- The first 10 amendments of the Constitution
- Protects individual rights and liberties affecting all aspects of American life
- The Second Amendment protects the right of individuals to bear arms.



Protections Found in Other Amendments

- The Reconstruction Amendments
 - The Thirteenth, Fourteenth, and Fifteen Amendments
 - Enacted after the Civil War
 - Provide constitutional protection to freed slaves
- Several amendments protect the right to vote.



The Bill of Rights and State Government

- The Fourteenth Amendment
 - Federal protection against state deprivation of civil rights
 - Privileges and immunities, due process, equal protection
- The Incorporation Doctrine
 - Extended the Bill of Rights to state action



Due Process Clauses of the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments

- Both the Fifth and the Fourteenth Amendments contain Due Process clauses.
- The Court has used these amendments toward procedural and substantive rights.
- Includes: proper notice and right to a fair hearing



The Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment

- Used by the Supreme Court to invalidate discriminatory state laws
- Originally intended to prevent states from discriminating against African Americans
- Landmark ruling in Brown v. Board of Education (1954)



Privileges and Immunities Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment

- Considered in evaluating violations of civil rights by states
- · Saenz v. Roe



Congress and Civil Rights Legislations

- State Action Doctrine
 - Questioned constitutionality of Civil Rights
 Act because it outlawed private conduct
- Interstate Commerce Clause
 - Laws that prohibited discrimination by businesses involved in interstate commerce
